Low Risk: Something which may result in a minor injury or slight harm (i.e. scratch or bruise)

Medium Risk: Something which may result in a significant injury (broken bone or other injury that requires hospital treatment)

High Risk: Something which may result in extensive injury or death

You <u>must</u> also ensure that appropriate persons are aware of any generic procedures, but these do not need to be repeated here. The activity must only take place if the residual risk following implementation of control measures is deemed to be acceptable.
